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# Traffic police –drastic and disproportionate cuts

# Key points

- Traffic police have suffered disproportionately under budget cuts
- According to the Home Office, traffic police officers (outside of London)
  - o have fallen by 43% since 2010, compared to 17% drop in police overall
  - fell by at least five times as much as total police in six police services (Cambridgeshire, Dyfed-Powys, Hertfordshire, Lincolnshire, Norfolk, and Northamptonshire)
  - o continued to fall in the last year, whereas total police numbers stabilised
  - o currently account for only 3.1% of total police in England and Wales

#### RoadPeace calls

Traffic units must be spared further cuts, and investment allocated to strengthening them, as done in London. Our roads will not be made safer or feel safer until more traffic officers are seen enforcing traffic laws.

Current calls by the government for police to prioritise tackling knife crime must come with additional investment and not at the expense of traffic units whose numbers have already been cut too much.

#### Introduction

In 2010, Teresa May, then Home Secretary, announced police budgets were to be cut. This briefing highlights the impact on traffic police with a comparison to total policing. Roads policing is not recognised by the Home Office as core (priority) work for the police.

Data is from the Home Office's annual statistics on police workforce which defines traffic police as full time officers enforcing traffic offences, special escort officers, motorway policing teams, Automatic Number Plate Recognition officers and collision investigation units (Home Office, 2018). Data is presented by police region (which cover three to six police services), individual police services (referred to as police force area (PFA) by the Home Office), and given for both traffic police and total police for 2009/10 to 2017/18 (See Appendices).

As shown below, traffic police have been cut much more than police overall

- Outside of London, traffic police have been cut 2 ½ times that of total police
- In London, the Metropolitan Police Service (MPS) created the Roads and Transport Policing Command in early 2015 which saw traffic police rise from 264 to 1433. This merger was funded mainly by Transport for London (65%). London is thus discussed separately.

# Change in traffic police (see Appendix 1)

- Traffic police have declined by at least half in four of the 10 police regions: South West (-63%), East of England (-55%), North East (-53%) and Yorkshire and Humber (-50%).
- In addition to the MPS, three police services recorded an increase in traffic units: Warwickshire (10 to 68), West Mercia (101 to 147) and Cheshire (90 to 98).
- All other police services recorded a decline, with the largest in Cleveland, down 78% (115 to 25), Devon and Cornwall, down 76% (239 to 57), and Norfolk, down 75% (103 to 26).
- Other police services where the decline was more than half were Greater Manchester (310 to 134), Leicestershire (86 to 42), Avon and Somerset (157 to 71), Wiltshire (83 to 28) and Gloucestershire (65 to 29).

### Changes in total police officers (see Appendix 2)

- The police region with the lowest decrease was Wales (7%), whilst the North East had the highest decrease (25%).
- All police services saw a decline in overall numbers of officers, except for Surrey, where there was a 6% increase.
- Eleven police services saw decreases of 20% or more, of which nine were in the Midlands and the North.




Figure 1 Decline in traffic and total officer numbers relative to 2009/10 (%), excluding London

#### Disproportionate cuts (See Appendix 3)

- Percentage fall in traffic police was less than that of total police in only six PFAs: Cheshire, MPS, Nottinghamshire, Staffordshire, Warwickshire and West Mercia.
- In all other PFAs it was greater. In most PFAs the drop was two or more times as great as that of the total, as shown in Table 2.

In the last year reported (2016/17-2017/18)

- Whilst total police remained stable in England and Wales, traffic police continued to fall, down another 7%.
- 28 police services reported a decrease, with the largest in Northamptionshire (-43%), from 52 officers to 30, and the West Midlands (-31%), down from 240 officers to 166
- Nottinghamshire reported an increase of 161%, rising from 18 officers to 47

#### RoadPeace calls

Traffic units must be spared further cuts, and investment allocated to strengthening them, as done in London. Our roads will not be made safer or feel safer until more traffic officers are seen enforcing traffic laws.

Current calls by the government for police to prioritise tackling knife crime must come with additional investment and not at the expense of traffic units whose numbers have already been cut too much.

RoadPeace is campaigning for road crime to be treated as real crime. This includes producing a series of briefings highlighting the infrequency and inconsistency of traffic offences being detected, and the need to reform our sentencing for road traffic crime.
